In memoriam

David Smith, a long-time member and a wealth of knowledge died this month surrounded by his family. He was well known in the village and was a close friend of our co-chair, Corin Mills. Here is an excerpt from Corin's memorial talk:



"I first met him when I retired and came to live in Ewyas Harold in 2015. A kind neighbour told his wife that a chap had moved into the village, bringing with him a 50 year old Fiat 500, a bunch of assorted stationary engines and an old cement mixer.

David quickly realised that he and I must have the same disease – an addiction to old things and fixing them, so he asked me to visit the charity with him and I took the bait, hook, line, and sinker.

He gave me some excellent advice – "Beware of getting involved with the administration" he said. Unfortunately, I took no notice of him and before long, I'd become a Trustee, and finally Co-Chairman,

which is why I'm here today, speaking to you all.

David was the "go to" man when it came to the identification and use of many unusual, donated tools. His knowledge was wide ranging and immense. His mantra was – "You've got to have the right tools for the job, and they have to be kept in working condition". To this end, he was forever nagging his wife to clean the garden tools properly after use so they wouldn't go rusty.

He was a perfectionist when it came to the rehandling of tools and the sharpening of axes and scythes, no doubt due to his work as a youth in the old blacksmiths shop, where the Forge Garage now stands. He didn't keep his skills to himself either and he was always a patient adviser to the volunteers in the workshop on the best techniques to refurbish tools.

But he didn't volunteer just because of his interest in old tools, he firmly believed that he was helping to reduce poverty in rural Tanzania, so I have to tell you a little about the Charity itself. "
