The WCVA Volunteer Main Grant we received has now officially come to an end. Over the past 18 months, this funding has enabled us to purchase the new van, refurbish the workshop toilet, almost complete the new depot toilet, provide training opportunities, cover recruitment advertising costs, and modernise our social media presence (Facebook, Instagram, and our website) to make it more up-to-date and bilingual. Many of us were involved in these projects, both at the workshop and the depot – for example, Phil did an excellent job on the workshop toilet, with great support from the team there. We're very grateful to everyone who contributed to delivering these improvements.

In Tanzania

The good news: container 22 arrived safely and has been unloaded and sorted by the crew. It is a much needed influx of tools and a lot of work for them in the coming months.

The bad news: The run up to the elections was difficult and tinged with inuendo and outright claims of corruption. The ruling party imprisoned opposition leaders and, it was claimed, rigged the election outcome to ensure a continuation of the current government. When the result was announced rioting and deaths occurred across the nation and was felt most deeply in Dar es Salaam and Mwanza. The government shut down all Internet access and we lost communication with our staff for a few tense days. We've managed to contact them, now the 'net is back, and *they're safe but worried* as you might expect.

TFSR Cymru has no interest in who runs the government of Tanzania, we are far too grassroots to get involved with such things, we only hope that the people of Tanzania can find a way to resolve this as soon as possible and let the violence subside.
